To that end we are sending out our newsletter to let you know what we are working on and how your money is being spent. We take the responsibility of being stewards of your money as our highest priority.

DPHF Annual Grant

As we mentioned in our last newsletter, DPHF reviewed five grant proposals last year during our open grant period. The research committee reviewed the proposals on well-established criteria including: Scientific Merit, Impact, Relevance, Attainability of Objectives, Appropriate Budget and Technical writing.

Our initial grant recipient was Tamas D. Ambrisko, DVM, PhD, DACVAA, DECVAA Assistant Professor of Anesthesiology and Pain Management at the University of Illinois at Champaign – Urbana, School of Veterinary Medicine The one year study explores the use of High-Frequency QRS Electrocardiography to detect occult dilated cardiomyopathy in Doberman Pinschers. The goal of this research would be to create an inexpensive, accurate, high speed diagnostic tool, that can be used for early diagnosis of cardiac disease. If this is successful, it could replace the need for a 24 hour Holter.

Thanks to the generous support of our Donors, DPHF was able to reopen our grant process and award two additional grants at the beginning of 2020.

The first grant was awarded as additional funding for last year's grant recipient. The new grant of \$6500 was awarded for the purpose of testing additional Dobermans. Dr. Ambrisko indicated that while he had a good response to his initial collection of data, not all of the participants had provided the follow up data that he needed to complete the study. DPHF is committed to making this study a success and we need your help to do that. If you participated in this study, please contact Dr. Ambrisko with your follow up 24 hour holter testing results.

Dr. Ambrisko also informed us of another unrelated research project that they are currently considering at the University of Illinois at Champaign. This potential study would use machine learning to predict human patients who are affected with COVID-19 and are more likely to suffer with cardiac complications as a result of the illness. One of the challenges this project would face is the ability to collect enough human cardiac data to build the statistical information needed for a machine learning model. In an effort to speed that process up, DPHF was contacted about using the data previously collected in the project we funded to form a statistical model for their machine learning project. DPHF has authorized the use of that data to assist in the initial development of the model, however this project, like all University lead research, is dependent on obtaining funding to move forward. While we are not certain this research will actually be funded and proceed, we wanted to let you know about it. We are encouraged that the work we fund may be leveraged for far reaching research, and believe it embodies our commitment to be good stewards of your generous donations.

The second grant we awarded this year was \$8500 to Amara H. Estrada, DVM, Diplomate ACVIM (Cardiology), Professor of Cardiology, Department of Small Animal Clinical Sciences, University of Florida, College of Veterinary Medicine, for a gene splicing research project. The study will include both the "PDK4"(DCM1) gene as well as the "Titan"(DCM2) gene. The process will involve growing heart cells in a petri dish and measuring flexibility response to certain fuels. The bad genes will then be removed and replaced with good genes and the response to those fuels will be measured again. If there is no response in flexibility it will indicate that there is another contributing factor that has not yet been identified.

If the result is a normal response to various fuel sources it is believed the issue has been identified and this could be the first step in developing a treatment to DCM. The results of this study also have the potential to be useful in human research into inherited DCM.

We hope you see the same value in the research we are funding that we do. Your continued support will help us further our mission.
