## **2023 Grant Recipient**

The DPHF is proud to announce our 2023 grant recipient.

We would like to thank our research committee for their hard work in selecting this worthwhile project from the field of grant proposals we received.

Our 2023 grant recipient is:

Dr. Molly McCue, DVM, MS, PhD, DACVIM (LAIM) - University of Minnesota Professor, Equine Medicine, Genomics & Population Medicine Associate Dean for Research, College of Veterinary Medicine

"Defining genetic architecture and enabling early detection of Doberman hepatitis"

This research is part of the <u>Disappearing Doberman Project</u> and addresses Liver Disease in the Doberman Pinscher.

Liver Disease is a complex issue in the breed. Doberman Pinchers are susceptible to both Copper Storage Disease and Chronic Active Hepatitis.

Copper Storage Disease results when an excess of copper is built up and stored in the liver.

Chronic Active Hepatitis appears to be an immune mediated disease resulting in inflammation of the liver.

The study hypothesizes that Doberman hepatitis is a complex trait resulting from alleles in a large number of genes involved in copper metabolism and immunoregulation, and the interaction of those alleles with the environment.

This study will be based on a sample size of 300 dogs divided equally between dogs diagnosed with one or both conditions and a control group of dogs 8 years old or older with normal liver values. The goal is to identify the alleles and genes involved in liver disease to create a genetic test that can identify dogs at risk. It is believed that this will allow for early testing and intervention resulting in a longer life span for dogs with these conditions.

## **Previously Funded Grant Update**

Dr. Andrea Pires dos Santos – Purdue University

"MicroRNA-based profile for the prognosis of diffuse large B-cell lymphoma"

We have exciting news to share on the Lymphoma MicroRNA based profile study at Purdue University.

The study successfully identified microRNA-based biomarkers to help predict the prognosis of lymphoma in dogs.

The University recently published their results in <u>Frontier Oncology</u> and hope to have their main manuscript published in the near future.

Dr. Andrea Pires dos Santos provided us the following synopsis of their project for our supporters.

"Diffuse large B-cell lymphoma (DLBCL) is the most common form of

lymphoma in dogs and is highly comparable to its human counterpart. The development of the condition is rapid, and the treatment must be aggressive to achieve cancer remission and extend life.

Researchers have proposed microRNAs, small molecules that dictate how genes work, are essential in cancer and other health problems and can predict how patients will respond to cancer treatment. Our research group confirmed and measured the expression of the microRNAs in 44 lymph nodes obtained from DLBCL-affected dogs with well-annotated treatment and survival data using molecular techniques. We subsequently established a connection between microRNA's expression levels and progression-free survival (PFS) or how long the dogs stayed cancer-free after treatment.

Our study indicates that one group of microRNAs has a robust association with shorter PFS in canine DLBCL. There was remarkably expression of miR-16-5p and miR-192-5p in dogs with reduced PFS. Based on these findings, microRNA profiling may help predict poor outcomes following the treatment of dogs with DLBCL. Identifying specific microRNAs that correlate with the progression of canine DLBCL may help predict which dogs will respond to the standard therapy giving them a better chance of recovery and developing better treatment options for dogs with DLBCL"
